

PE and School Sport Action Plan Lewannick School 2022–2023

Background - The primary school sport premium investment goes direct to primary school Head Teachers and is designed to support improvements in the quality and depth of PE and school sport. In 2017/18 the amount schools receive each year has doubled.

Key Indicators - The Department for Education vision is that all pupils leaving primary school are physically literate and have the knowledge, skills and motivation necessary to equip them for a healthy lifestyle and lifelong participation in physical activity and sport. The objective is to achieve self-sustaining improvement in the quality of PE and sport that delivers high quality provision of a balanced and holistic PE and school sport offer. There are 5 key indicators that schools should expect to see improvement across:

- 1. The engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity the Chief Medical Officer guidelines recommend that all children and young people aged 5 to 18 engage in at least 60 minutes of physical activity a day, of which 30 minutes should be in school
- 2. The profile of PE and sport is raised across the school as a tool for whole-school improvement
- 3. Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport
- 4. Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils
- 5. Increased participation in competitive sport

Funding - Individual schools will receive circa £16K –17K per annum (depending on the number of pupils) which they can use to support these outcomes through various options including; release of staff for CPD, employing specialists to work alongside teachers, cluster work with other schools and partnerships, transport, equipment, hall and pool hire etc.

Key achievements to date:

- There is continuity and progression in the delivery of curriculum PE and there is an engaging, broad and balanced curriculum in place.
- Playground area is engaging and children have equipment to use which increases their physical activity.
- Key members of staff within the school have an increased knowledge and understanding in the delivery of PE school sport and physical activity.
- Playground leaders within the school and the playground promote health and well-being.
- Outdoor learning took place across the school, with the introduction of a wild tribe day.
- PE leader upskilled through a PE MOT day.
- Whole school took part in an alternative sports day
- Outdoor adventure trips took place for both K\$1 and K\$2
- 75% of Year 6 children could leave being able to swim 25 metres

Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need:

- A variety of programmes to increase the number of children active for 30 active minutes. Eg active maths/active classrooms and ensure a range of programmes are on offer.
- To investigate the use of a participation monitoring programme which collects participation data accurately.
- To provide wild tribe first aid days for all of KS2 over 2 days
- To provide a wild tribe activity day for KS1
- To provide an alternative sports day for the whole school
- To continue to upskill the PE leader through a PE MOT day
- Continue to replenish sports equipment for PE teaching and after-school clubs
- To continue to provide outdoor adventure activity trips for KS1 and KS2
- To provide a block of top-up swimming lessons for all children in K\$1 and K\$2
- To increase the number of children who can swim 25 metres
- To continue to upscale teachers with the teaching of PE through the Arena package of sport specialist teachers
- Continuation of a lunchtime club to try and increase the number of children who are active for 30 minutes
